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2007 Virginia Beach Fact Sheet

Destination Overview

In Virginia Beach, visitors are invited to “Live the Beach Life!” Offering the classic beach vacation, Virginia Beach maintains a long-standing reputation as a family-friendly oceanfront resort. Visitors are greeted by a recently-widened 300-foot wide beach lined by Virginia Beach’s three-mile concrete oceanfront Boardwalk. After spending lazy days on the beach, the state parks and Back Bay National Wildlife Refuge beckon, enticing visitors to embark on a hiking, kayaking, or biking adventure. Fishing, golfing, whale watching, dolphin watching, historic landmarks, and exciting attractions and popular events complete the Beach experience. Virginia Beach offers seaside lodging with spectacular views and delectable seafood dining experiences. With a mild climate year-round, Virginia Beach is the ideal vacation destination for every season.



Virginia Beach Convention Center

The resort city is one of the nation’s premier year-round meeting destinations. The new Virginia Beach Convention Center was completed in January 2007, offering meeting planners over 500,000 sq. ft. of flexible meeting space. As a destination marketing organization, the Virginia Beach Convention & Visitors Bureau (CVB) manages the Convention Center, which hosts regional and national trade shows, conventions, sports tournaments and special events, and sponsors some of the city's major festivals and special events. The CVB is a city department that also plans and implements marketing strategies to attract consumer travelers, convention and meeting groups, as well as group tours.



Location

Centrally located on the East Coast, Virginia Beach is situated in the southeastern corner of the state where Virginia meets the sea. The resort city is within easy fly-drive access of two-thirds of the U.S. population. Norfolk International Airport - which hosts most major airline carriers and offers 200 flights daily - is just 20 minutes from the Virginia Beach oceanfront. Virginia Beach is also situated 45 minutes from Newport News/Williamsburg International Airport. For visitors driving to Virginia Beach, the resort city is just four hours away from Washington, D.C. and two hours from Richmond, Va.

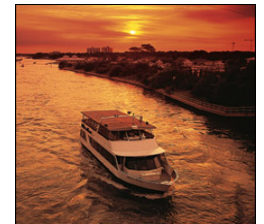

Accessibility

Virginia Beach is primarily a drive destination – more than 94% of its visitors arrive by automobile. When approaching from the west, the easiest routes are Interstate 64, U.S. 460 or U.S. 58. From the north and south, convenient routes are Interstates 85 or 95, U.S. 17 and U.S. 13 (crossing the world-famous Chesapeake Bay-Bridge Tunnel, a 17-mile span connecting Virginia’s Eastern Shore with Virginia Beach). These routes intersect with Interstate 64, which connects with Interstate 264, which leads directly to the Virginia Beach oceanfront. An Amtrak train connection is available in Newport News, a neighboring city to Virginia Beach. Greyhound and Trailways Bus Lines also operate in the area.



Beginning at mile-marker zero, recreational boaters can follow the Intracoastal Waterway where the Atlantic Ocean meets the mouth of the Chesapeake Bay into the area. From Virginia Beach, they can travel as far north as Boston, Mass. and south to Brownsville, Texas.



Tourism and Visitor Profile

Approximately 2.6 million people visit Virginia Beach annually, spending \$828 million and providing approximately 14,204 jobs within the city. This makes tourism of the largest economic industries for Virginia Beach. Typically, the Virginia Beach visitor is between 35-54 years old, married with children and has a yearly family income of more than \$82,800. A large majority of visitors arrive from the mid-Atlantic region. The city's top states of visitor origin in descending order are: Virginia, Pennsylvania, Ohio, New York, Maryland, West Virginia, North Carolina, Connecticut, New Jersey, Massachusetts, Michigan, Texas, Illinois, South Carolina and The Northern Virginia, Maryland, West Virginia and D.C. DMA is the top DMA for total visitation, with 16.9% of visitors arriving from that DMA. Summer travelers from Canada make up 9.2% of overall visitation. The average distance traveled by visitors to Virginia Beach was 409 miles and 80.9% were repeat visitors - almost 90% of visitors said that Virginia Beach is a very good or a great place to visit. *(Statistics based on the 2006 Summer Visitor Survey, and the 2005 Virginia Beach Tourism Impact Study, authorized by the Virginia Beach Convention & Visitors Bureau.)*



Climate

The seaside resort’s mild climate year-round continues to surprise visitors, adding to Virginia Beach’s appeal as a quality destination for every season. Of Virginia Beach’s 2.6 million visitors, 63% percent visit in the shoulder season, (after Labor Day and before Memorial Day). For travelers in search of a more relaxed pace, these seasons are ideal for uncrowded beaches and back-to-nature activities. Winter Whale Watching and *Chick-Fil-A Holiday Lights at the Beach* add to the “cool season” vacation experience.

Ocean and Bay Beaches

With 35 miles of waterfront property, Virginia Beach has long been considered a “classic American beach vacation” spot. In Virginia Beach, a total of 14 miles of beach is free and open to the public. In the **Virginia Beach resort area**, newly-landscaped pedestrian beach entrances are easy to find, and parking is ample. If your idea of a "day at the beach" is more relaxed, visit Chesapeake Beach (known to the locals as "Chick's Beach") for a more tranquil vacation spot along the scenic Chesapeake Bay. Swimmers will enjoy the bay's protected shallow waters. For a more secluded environment, the Sandbridge area on Virginia Beach's southern shore is perfect.



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The pristine shores of Sandbridge are quiet and untouched by the hands of modernization, but only 20 minutes from the main resort area. No hotels. Just breathtaking ocean-view rental homes, condominiums and peacefulness fill the Sandbridge shoreline. White sand sweeps from the shore to the streets where the traffic is less and seagulls leave long-lasting footprints.



Oceanfront Boardwalk

The Virginia Beach boardwalk dates back to 1888, and has been ranked among the Best American Boardwalks by *Discovery Channel's* discovery.com, "Dr. Beach," *Southern Living* and *Coastal Living* Today, the three-mile concrete thoroughfare is an impressive 28 feet wide with a separate bike path, making it ideal for strolling, rollerblading and biking. Entertainment is offered nightly during the summer months and four oceanfront stages at 7th, 17th, 24th and 31st Streets provide live musical acts. For handicapped accessibility, ramps from the boardwalk to the beach are available at every block. Located at 8th, 17th, 24th and 30th Streets are eight-foot wooden

walkways that reach the water's edge. Accessible restrooms are located at 17th, 24th and 30th Streets. Handicapped parking can be found along the main thoroughfare.

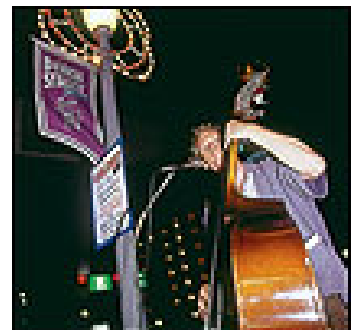


Lodging and Dining

Virginia Beach is an accommodating destination, with nearly 11,000 hotel rooms, more than 1,800 campsites and several hundred rental cottages – and most offer ocean or bay-front vistas. Nearly 300 restaurants serve up succulent seafood dishes, from fresh Chesapeake Bay crab cakes and steamed shrimp to stuffed flounder and the local favorite, striped bass (also known as the "rockfish"). The restaurants celebrate a diverse range of choices from Italian and Japanese to Mexican and Indian cultures. Agriculture is one of the top three industries in Virginia Beach, with miles of green space in the southern end of the city harvesting produce from fresh strawberries to yellow corn and squash. Therefore, the restaurants are enticing visitors with the freshest seafood *and* the freshest produce.

Entertainment

When the sun goes down in Virginia Beach, more fun begins. The Verizon Wireless Virginia Beach Amphitheater, with a 20,000 seating capacity, showcases such national recording artists as Elton John, Sheryl Crow and Jimmy Buffett, among others. Nightclubs in Virginia Beach offer everything from Top 40 and jazz to country, reggae, comedy and the regional favorite – beach music! And Virginia Beach's music festivals are among the best on the East Coast. Kicking off Memorial Day Weekend, *Beach Street USA* provides free nightly family entertainment in and around the oceanfront area from the boardwalk to Atlantic Avenue. Roaming jugglers, musical acts, clowns and dramatic acts add a little Mardi Gras flavor.



The Arts

Each year, more than 400 artists travel to Virginia Beach for one of the nation's most prestigious events, *The Boardwalk Art Show and Festival*, which is ranked as one of the Top 15 fine art shows in the country by *Sunshine Artist Magazine*. And, it's only natural that a city maintaining such a long-standing association with the arts has its own outstanding visual arts center. The Contemporary Art Center of Virginia's changing exhibits feature painting, sculpture, photography, glass, video and other visual media from internationally acclaimed artists as well as artists of national and regional renown. Additionally, visitors can experience opera, dance and musical performances at venues throughout the region. Each spring, Virginia Beach also participates as a regional venue in the annual *Virginia Arts Festival*, which brings some of the world's finest performers of classical music, dance, world beat and more to the Hampton Roads area.

Shopping

Virginia Beach's newest downtown area, **Town Center**, will span 17 city blocks and provides a mix of upscale retail, luxury residential, and an array of cafes and restaurants, along with business-class and deluxe hotels. A performing arts center and a new Westin are also scheduled to open at Town Center in 2007. The city also is home **Lynnhaven Mall** and **Hilltop Shopping Center**. Approximately five minutes from the oceanfront, the Hilltop area contains several smaller shopping centers with stores such as Williams-Sonoma, Talbots, and Blue Ridge Mountain Sports. Along Atlantic Avenue, visitors will find a number of quaint boutiques and souvenir shops offering a variety of selections.

Military Installations

At the jet observation park in Virginia Beach, visitors can watch the Navy's most sophisticated aircrafts taking off and landing at **Oceana Naval Air Station**. It is one of only two master jet bases in the U.S. Navy and is host to the F/A-18 Hornet aircraft. **Fort Story** was established in 1917 as a coastal artillery post. Its history, however, dates to 1607 when America's first English settlers touched shore there before continuing on to Jamestown. Today, the installation is a training and test site for the Army's Joint Logistics-Over-the-Shore (J-LOTS). Its oceanfront location, two historic lighthouses, First Landing Cross and Battle Off the Capes Monument make it a popular stop for visitors. Other military bases in Virginia Beach include: the **Naval Amphibious Base Little Creek**, the major operating base for the amphibious forces of the United States Atlantic Fleet and the largest base of its kind in the world; **Fleet Combat Training Center, Atlantic, Dam Neck**, which provides training in the operation and employment of combat direction and control systems; and the State Military Reservation, also called **Camp Pendleton**, which the state has traditionally allocated primarily for the use of the Virginia National Guard. *Note: Access to military bases may be restricted for public tours and a valid picture ID is required.*



Awards

Throughout the years, Virginia Beach has received numerous accolades. In 2006, the resort city was honored with the following recognitions: *Men's Fitness* ranked Virginia Beach the No. 3 fittest city in America. *Money Magazine* named Virginia Beach the sixth-best big city in the U.S. *Fit Pregnancy* named Virginia Beach the most stroller-friendly city, as well as one of the top 50 "Best Cities to Have a Baby." *Reader's Digest* named Virginia Beach one of the "Best Seaside Strolls" in America. Virginia Beach's Rock-n-Roll Half Marathon was voted the 5th favorite half marathon in the country by the readers of *Runner's World*. And the American Podiatric Medical Association and *Prevention* magazine named Virginia Beach as one of the 10 Best Walking Cities in America for 2006.

In 2005, *USA Today* recognized Virginia Beach’s boardwalk among the Top 10. In 2004, *TravelChannel.com* named Virginia Beach the 5th Best American Boardwalk, and *Byways* named Virginia Beach among the Top 50 U.S. motorcoach destinations. Virginia Beach was recognized as the most technology-advanced city government in the nation with more than 250,000 residents, according to the 2004 Digital Cities Survey. Also in 2004, a Sperling’s BestPlaces survey listed Virginia Beach as the 8th least-stressful city in the nation. Virginia Beach also has received top honors as a convention destination from *Successful Meetings, Meetings & Conventions* and *Black Meetings & Tourism*.
